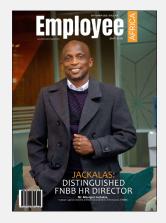

# LEADERSHIP WITH PURPOSE

OTSETSWE KOBOYANKWE NACB, Acting Chief Executive Officer

The old adage "dynamites come in small packages", is personified in Ms Otsetswe Keletso Koboyankwe, the Acting Chief Executive Officer of the National Arts Council of Botswana (NACB). A leader with a purpose to position the creative and cultural sector as a key contributor to the economy of Botswana. WRITES STAFF REPORTER

etting the tone and commenting on her leadership and management mantra, Koboyankwe boldly declared "I believe in meritocracy. With a staff complement that is relatively young, it is heartwarming to see young people have the zeal and energy to bring innovative ideas. It is critical to encourage and offer support on the basis of merit," she mentioned, solidifying her leadership direction filled with purpose and sustainability. Furthermore, Koboyankwe stated that some of the qualities that make her a good leader is the curiosity to learn and constantly improve and the ability to receive feedback and introspect.

### **DECORATED CAREER**

The soft spoken Otsetswe's decorated and colourful career journey began from humble beginnings. A lawyer by profession, she began her career in 2008 at the Attorney General (AG) Chambers where her duties included provision of legal advice for and on behalf of Government Ministries and departments. During her tenure, she assisted with drafting numerous of pieces of legislation. Ms Koboyankwe also assisted in drafting the Attorney General's Chambers Corruption Prevention Committee Code of Ethics. Due to her unwavering commitment, she was appointed a member of the taskforce on the domestication of Convention on the Elimination of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW in Botswana - Gender Affairs Department.

Following her successful stint at AGC, she then joined Civil Aviation Authority of Botswana (CAAB) from 2016 to 2017 as Chief Legal Services Officer and promoted to General Legal Counsel in 2017. She has managed legal and contractual risks and ensured effective enforcement of aviation regulations with decisive follow up, investigations and intervention. Subsequently appointed the Chairperson of the Legislative Review Committee of the CAAB where she championed the review of all pieces of aviation legislation and accompanying



regulations. Koboyankwe has provided legal advisory services at regional and international bodies such as Interim SADC Safety Organisation (ISASO), formerly COSCAP, African Civil Aviation Commission (AFCAC) and International Civil Aviation Organisation (ICAO).

### **NACB MANDATE**

Having joined the NACB in 2023, Koboyankwe leads the implementation of the Council's mandate that includes developing, protecting the diverse promoting, and

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creative arts and cultures in Botswana. In addition, Koboyankwe noted that NACB is tasked with establishing NACB District offices to cater for local arts and culture practitioners and improve on the accessibility of the Council's programmes. It also collaborates and partners with recognized bodies to advance the creative and cultural sector as well as encouraging and facilitating commercialisation of arts and culture through these partnerships.

The determined leader, Koboyankwe, said the strategic vision over the next five years is for NACB to be a sustainable hub for the creative sector. "A hub is a centre or geographic concentration that brings together companies, entrepreneurs, investors and other relevant players in the creative and cultural sector. It is characterized as a vibrant and dynamic business ecosystem, where collaboration, innovation and knowledge sharing are fully encouraged," she said.

### **TECHNOLOGICAL EXPOSURE**

With organisations now tapping into new technologies for driving strategy and vision for growth, NACB is not an exception to technological disruption. "Being at the helm of NACB, I want to build an organisation that makes it possible for Batswana artists to access international markets. I aim to develop policies that encompass digitisation and the use of AI. Supporting digital content creation will accelerate and support the creative economy growth with a consequential positive net effect on the overall GDP of Botswana," she added.

She said she would like to see artists being enabled, to monetise from the TikTok, YouTube and other digital platforms. "Embracing digitization within the creative sector is critical. For example, embracing nonfungible tokens (NFTs) to represent digital drawings, paintings, music, films, poetry or even books. By using NFTs artists can sell or rent their artworks."

### SUCCESSFUL PROJECTS

Delving into how successful NACB has been under her leadership, the visionary Koboyankwe said "I have less than 2 years overall in NACB with approximately eleven (11) months at the helm of the organisation. During the past eleven (11) months; I have managed to implement two critical programmes that are part of the transitional plan between our parent Ministry and the NACB." The strategic programmes include the following:

### **Arts and Culture Grant**

According to her, the NACB Arts and Culture Grant aims to support the creative economy in the development, promotion, and preservation of the creative and cultural industries in Botswana. The grant, she said, supports individual artists, groups, and organizations that contribute to the growth and development of the arts in Botswana. Koboyankwe said financial support will be allocated to projects that align with the NACB strategic priorities.

In addition, she said NACB also has a Mobility Grant which aims to provide financial support to individuals or a group for travel locally, nationally, regionally, and internationally for participation in forums that develop and promote the arts and culture sector. Through the Mobility Grant, Koboyankwe revealed that they have managed to support artist travel around the world for different events flying the Botswana flag high.

For example, she said:

Mpho Sebina was facilitated to attend the 67th Grammy Awards in Los Angeles, United States of America. Mpho Sebina was voted in to the Grammys Recording Voting Academy in 2024, the first ever Motswana to do so.

Similarly, NACB funded Ms Masego Mohwasa and Ms Lerato Orapeleng to attend the Africa Magic Viewer's Choice Awards (AMVCAs), in Lagos, Nigeria, where their film "Mokwalo" was nominated. This is testament to the NACB's support to artist travel outside Botswana to go showcase authentic Botswana stories. Ms Koboyankwe reaffirmed NACB's commitment to uplifting the creative industry by supporting local filmmakers to represent Botswana in global stages such as AMCVAs, Cannes Film Festival.

Last but not least, NACB through its collaboration with The Republic of Estonia, will facilitate the screening of a local film Baratani [Hill of Lovers] at the Black Night Film Festival in November 2025. The Black Night Film Festival is an annual film event held in Tallin Estonia where participants get the opportunity to attend Business to Business meetings with fellow filmmakers, distributors, and other industry players. PÖFF is one of the biggest film festivals in the Northern Europe.

In November each year it brings the newest and most fascinating examples of the world's cinematography together with international film makers to the doorstep of local viewers. Around 4000 film festivals are held all over the world each year. Only 15 of them have received the A-category certification from the International Federation of Film Producers' Associations. PÖFF belongs to this A-category together with Cannes, Berlin, Venice, and other leading film festivals of the world.

NACB has also managed to fund the attendance of Ms Sello, the producer of the local film "Baratani".

Sponsored through the Arts & Culture Grant, a young Motswana was assisted to bring Hollywood star Ms Megan Good to come interact with Batswana film makers at the Dreamers Exchange Festival 2025.





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### **Shaka ILembe Masterclass**

Furthermore, Koboyankwe said NACB in collaboration with MultiChoice Botswana proudly hosted a Masterclass featuring the esteemed producers of Shaka iLembe, Ms. Desiree Markgraaf, CEO and Mr. Jacob Ntshangase, Head of Research both from The Bomb Shelter Film Company.

This engagement, she said, brought two of Africa's leading creative minds to Botswana to share their expertise and experience with our local filmmakers, writers, and storytellers. It forms part of NACB's broader commitment to fostering regional and continental connections that place Botswana's creative industries at the heart of Africa's cultural dialogue.

### National Arts Festival 2025

"The Council recently took over the National Arts Festival from our parent Ministry. The competition is a national event that brings the entire nation together in the spirit of celebration. It is the pinnacle of the heritage month and a platform for showcasing the cultural diversity that Botswana prides itself in," said Koboyankwe.

She said not only does the nation celebrate, but the artists are also rewarded for their talent and the unwavering commitment that they consistently display in the various fields of artistic excellence.

### Création Botswana

She said Création Botswana is a programme jointly implemented by Creation Botswana, supported by a tripartite; Alliance Française de Gaborone, the National Arts Council of Botswana, and the French Embassy in Botswana aimed at supporting and scaling up entrepreneurs in the fashion and textile industry in Botswana. The programmes objectives are to:

- Stimulate and support of fashion entrepreneurship;
- Bolster the fashion in Botswana;
- Promote international cooperation and business development;
- Connect fashion entrepreneurs with their peers in Africa and Europe;
- Strengthen Botswana-France relations;
- Encourage sustainable practices in fashion entrepreneurship.

"The Council is grateful for the French Embassy for its support both financially and technically by providing global expertise to train Batswana to become successful fashion entrepreneurs," she asserted.











### WORD OF ADVICE

Her word of advice to the arts and culture community is that it takes patience, humility and a lot of prayer to serve within the creative and cultural sector. She said the creative and cultural industries have traditionally not been given the due recognition and respect they deserve as key players within the economy of Botswana. "Art in Botswana was never recognised as an avenue through

which one could earn a living from as opposed to teaching, medicine and law. This has led to an entrenched malignment of artists, yet every aspect of our lives resolves around art," she said. "I have learnt to listen more and embrace the ideas they bring to the fore.

industries be a large contributor to the national GDP."

Lastly, Koboyankwe said aspiring leaders must learn to take advise and the support offered by the forerunners within the sector.

### **FUTURE OF ARTS**

Koboyankwe said as the Acting CEO of NACB, she would like to see major policy shift within the sector to create pathways that will facilitate and enable artists to tap into vast opportunities that already exist. She stated that there is a great need to enact laws that would enable the sector to thrive. According to Koboyankwe, many developed countries thrive on the creative and cultural sector, adding that there is need to unlock the nightlife economy in Botswana. "By night fall Gaborone becomes quiet, all activity dies down. This is in sharp contrast to developed countries where cities become a beehive of activity at night once the "formal" economy closes down," she said.

To close the glaring gaps, Koboyankwe said NACB will position artists and creatives at the centre of the economic ecosystem in Botswana.

### **CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES**

She said her biggest challenge has so far been inadequate funding to satisfy the demands by the artists. For example, as we administer the Art and Culture Grant, there is a huge demand for funding support.

"We are unable to fund all exceptional project proposals that we receive. We currently receive a grant amounting to P4 million. Our last Art and Culture Grant call received a total of 489 submissions with a funding need of approximately BWP 89 million. We were only able to fund 33 projects, "she said.

She added: "Despite this, we are working tirelessly to solicit funds from the private sector and international partners to enable the Council to continue supporting, developing and promoting the creative industry locally, regionally and internationally.

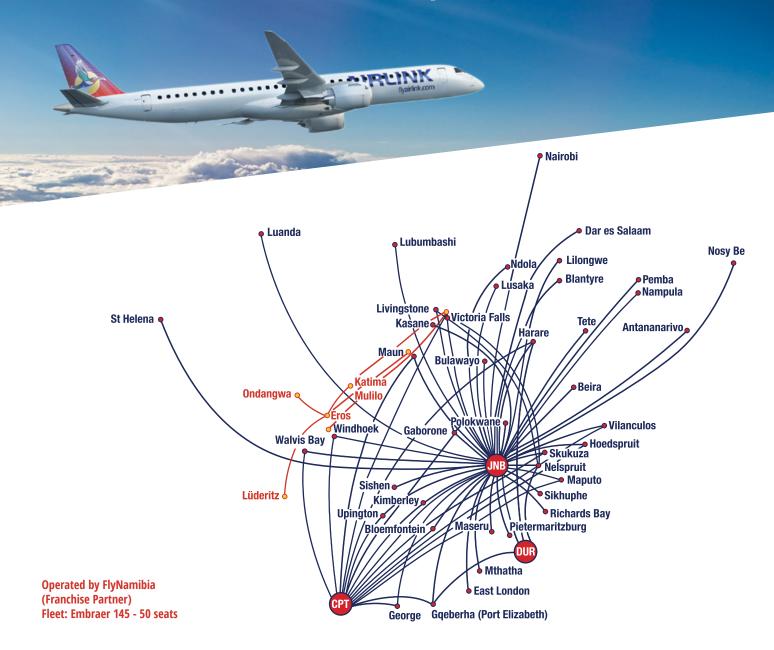

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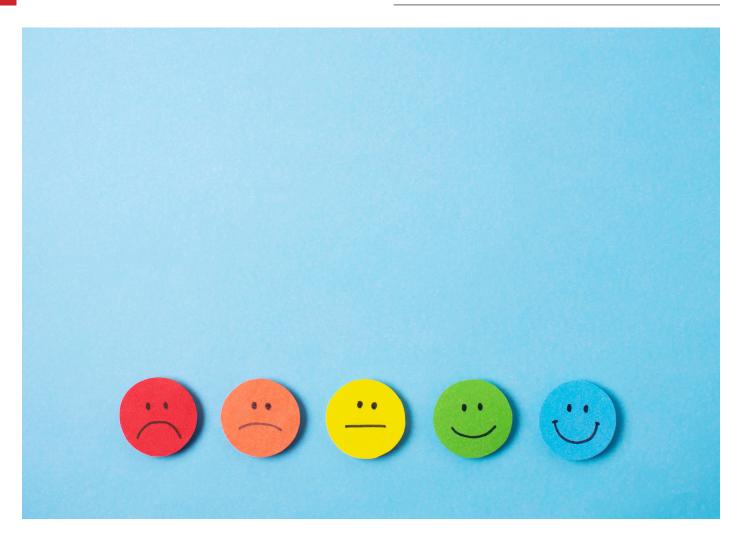

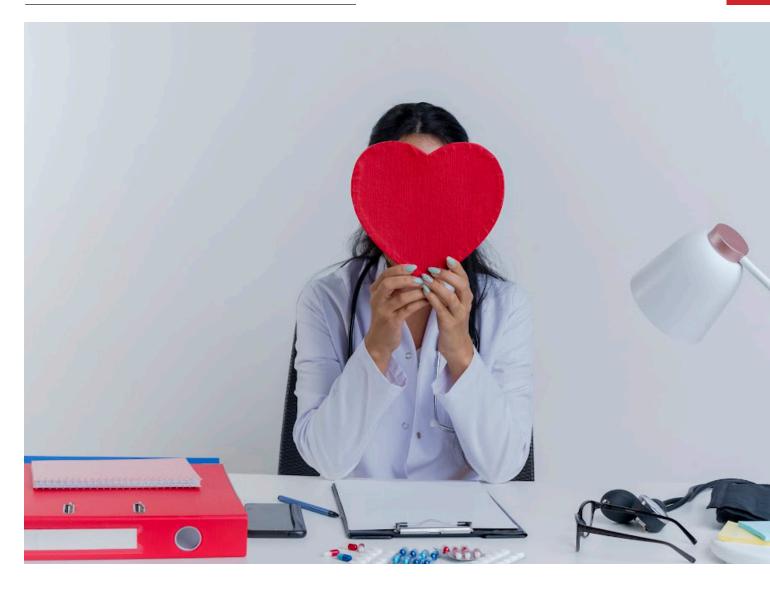

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## Tapping into Africa's 230-million AI-powered jobs opportunity

enya's budding skills ecosystem offers key learnings for African countries to scale digital capabilities, says Winnie Karanu, Microsoft Al Skills Director

By 2030, AI is projected to unlock 230 million digital jobs across Africa – a transformation comparable to South Korea's post-war rise or India's IT boom in the 1990s. Realizing this potential requires bold investment in digital skills across every corner of the economy.

Despite widespread ambition, with governments, donors, and private sector leaders prioritizing digital skills, progress remains uneven. The challenge is not only scale, but also coordination. Fragmented efforts and a lack of unified strategy continue to slow momentum and dilute impact.

To fully realize Al's potential for job creation, Africa must build a coordinated, inclusive skilling ecosystem, where government, education, industry, and civil society work together to shape the Al economy. This means moving beyond isolated programs to scalable frameworks that prepare diverse audiences, from policymakers and educators to entrepreneurs and job seekers. It also requires infrastructure and tools, including large language models (LLMs) tailored to Africa's linguistic, cultural, and socioeconomic contexts.

There is much to learn from the ongoing rollout of Kenya's Al Skilling Initiative (AINSI), which presents a promising approach to progress. Its framework offers valuable insights to inform similar efforts elsewhere.

### Government – the cornerstone of national Al capability

Strong government leadership is essential for building national AI capacity. Governments are uniquely positioned to set strategic priorities, regulate responsibly, and provide access to critical infrastructure and data.

Kenya's Regional Centre of Competence for Digital and AI Skilling is a compelling model for countries seeking to institutionalize AI training. Beyond training around 1,500 public servants in AI and cybersecurity, the Centre's structured approach, combining bootcamps and online programs, demonstrates how targeted, scalable interventions can build capacity across government, with almost 6,500 public sector officials across the country registered. Growing interest from countries like Uganda and Nigeria highlights its potential as a replicable model for inclusive and innovative AI ecosystems.

However, much work remains. To ensure skilling efforts lead to meaningful employment,

harmonizing credentials and recognized qualifications across regions is vital. This validates skillsets and helps employers identify talent with confidence. Governments play a central role in setting these standards and aligning them with industry needs.

### Industry – the vehicle for scaling transformation

For AI to drive national progress, it must be embedded across all industries, formal and informal. Micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSMEs), which account for over 44 million businesses across sub-Saharan Africa, are critical to this effort. Imagine how vast the impact would be if each MSME could use AI to hire just one more person?

AINSI's cross-sector partnerships are helping build momentum. Collaboration with the Kenya Private Sector Alliance (KEPSA) demonstrates how industry-led initiatives can accelerate AI skilling. KEPSA's training of over 70,000 organizational leaders, professionals and SMEs in AI and cybersecurity is helping drive progress from the top down. Yet, there is more to learn about reaching underserved sectors and sustaining long-term impact.

## McDonald's South Africa & CATHSSETA Partnership: Training 1,400 Unemployed Youth

cDonald's South Africa (MSA) is collaborating with the Culture, Arts, Tourism, Hospitality, and Sport Sector Education and Training Authority (CATHSSETA) to train 1,400 unemployed youth through a Hospitality Learnership Programme. This initiative aligns with CATHSSETA's recently adopted High Impact Programme, which aims to empower unemployed individuals with skills that could lead to employment within McDonald's and the broader hospitality sector. This initiative comes at a critical time, as continuous skills development is essential in countries with high youth unemployment rates.

CATHSSETA is one of the 21 Sector Education and Training Authorities (SETAs) established under the Skills Development Act (No. 97 of 1998) as amended. It was first established in 2001 as the Tourism and Hospitality Education and Training Authority (THETA), then re-established as CATHSSETA on April 1, 2012, to better reflect its broader mandate. Its mission is to facilitate skills development within its sub-sectors through grants for learning programs and the monitoring of education and training, as outlined in the National Skills Development Plan (NSDP), 2030.

CATHSSETA operates in the following subsectors:

- Arts, Culture, and Heritage
- Conservation
- Gaming and Lotteries
- Hospitality
- Sport, Recreation, and Fitness
- Tourism and Travel Services

"Our role and mandate, as set out in section 10 of the Skills Development Act, 1998, include developing and implementing a sector skills plan, which describes the trends in each sub-sector as well as the skills that are in demand. Additionally, this plan identifies priorities for skills development.

We support and administer learning programs, facilitate the implementation of the National Qualifications Framework (NQF), and conduct quality assurance on learning in line with Quality Council for Trades and Occupations (QCTO) requirements. We also undertake quality assurance and disburse mandatory and discretionary grants using the collected levies to the qualifying stakeholders to implement skills development initiatives. Employers pay 1% of their payroll to the

South African Revenue Service (SARS) monthly, of which CATHSSETA receives 80% for administration costs and grants, while the remaining 20% is paid to the National Skills Fund," says Marks Thibela, Chief Executive Officer at CATHSSETA.

Continuous skills development is crucial in addressing unemployment, as it equips individuals, especially the youth, with the knowledge and competencies needed to adapt to changing job markets and technological advancements. By enhancing their skills, workers and job seekers can improve their employability, thereby reducing the unemployment rate and contributing to the overall economic growth of the country.

McDonald's role in this partnership includes:

Recruitment: Driving mass awareness about the learnership to attract high-quality candidates and sharing the positive narrative of the partnership.

Engagement: Educating the public on participating in this initiative and providing regular stakeholder updates.

"Hospitality does not feature prominently in the top ten learnerships that people



talk about. The unemployment numbers among the youth are staggering, and as a responsible corporate citizen, we identified the need to bring CATHSSETA into the youth employment conversation. It was a meeting of minds, as their priority is skills development. Furthermore, we have partnered with Job Jack to ensure a seamless recruitment process, as they understand the technological preferences of Gen Z," says Greg Solomon, Chief Executive Officer at McDonald's South Africa.

McDonald's is prepared to train more than the 1,400-youth promised to CATHSSETA. The overwhelming response to the program highlights the urgent need for job creation in South Africa, as demonstrated by the 9,000 applicants, many of whom are graduates.

"The program required that we partner with a reputable training partner, and for this reason, we collaborated with Training Force, which focuses on delivering industry- and job-specific skills assessments and training interventions to businesses," continues Solomon.

The CATHSSETA & McDonald's SA

program offers blended training, combining classroom and on-the-job training and assessment, with courses such as Occupational Health, Safety and Security, Business Communication, and Business Finance. ## Google, PanSALB Launch AI Glossary In isiZulu, isiXhosa And Afrikaans



oogle, in partnership with the Pan South African Language Board (PanSALB), has launched a new Al Glossary for isiZulu, isiXhosa and Afrikaans, giving millions of South Africans the language tools to engage with artificial intelligence in their mother tongue.

The launch took place at Google's South Africa offices in Johannesburg, where representatives from the Pan South African Language Board, the Department of Sport, Arts and Culture, the Department of Basic Education, the Department of Higher Education, and the SABC were joined by academics, translators, and language experts. The event included a panel discussion on how African languages can adapt alongside technology.

The glossary defines 100 standard AI terms and their meanings in each of the three languages. This project builds on earlier work to produce a Swahili version in East Africa and is part of a broader collaboration between Google and African partners to make digital innovation more inclusive and bridge the digital divide for an estimated 266 million speakers of these four languages across the continent.

Among the terms defined are everyday concepts such as conversational AI – systems that simulate human dialogue

through natural language processing – and hallucination, which describes instances where AI tools generate information that sounds credible but is incorrect. Other entries, like active learning and noisy data, explain how machines are trained and refined through interaction and information filtering.

In Africa, English is the dominant language in technology and science, making it harder for non-English speakers to take part in conversations about new technologies. By defining key AI concepts in local languages, the glossary helps close this gap, giving people the words to engage confidently with emerging technologies and supporting developers, educators, translators and everyday users alike.

The glossary was developed through a highly collaborative process. Google, in partnership with Twaweza Communications and PanSALB, hosted a series of round-table discussions and workshops with linguists, lexicographers, AI experts, and academic and government stakeholders. This multiday process ensured the terms were not simply translated, but were standardised and adapted for each language to ensure accuracy and cultural relevance.

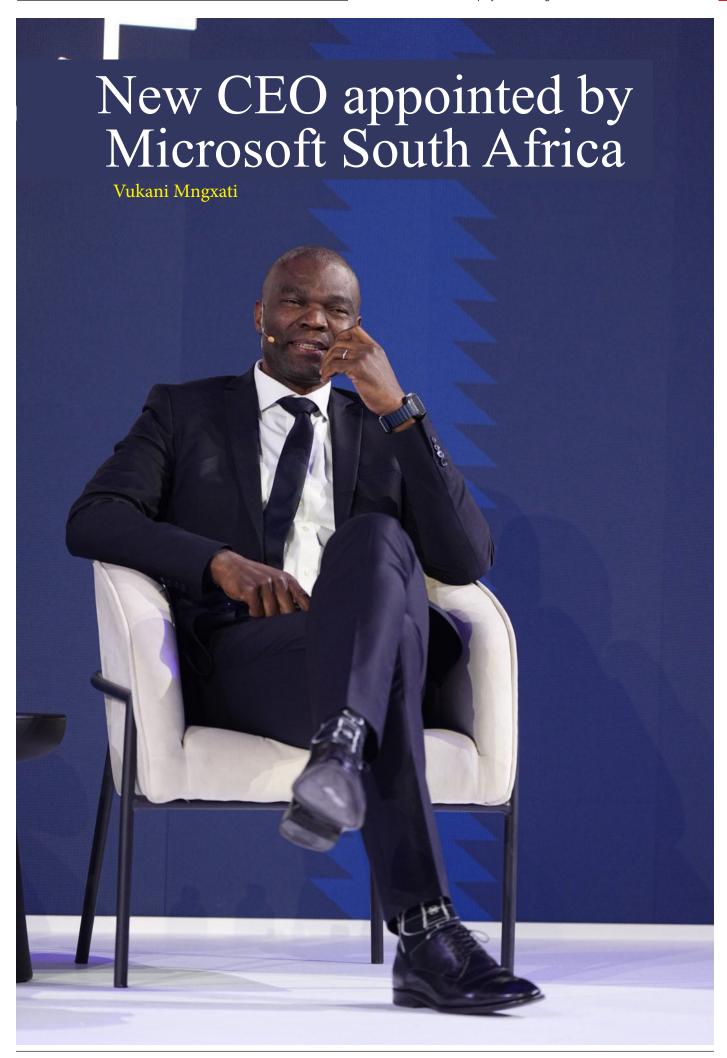

from Google said the project shows what can be achieved when technology companies and language institutions work together. "We want everyone to have the words to understand and shape the technologies that are changing the world," Makwane said. PanSALB chief executive, Lance Schultz, the partnership demonstrates how linguistic development and digital innovation can go hand in hand. "Our aim is to ensure that South Africa's languages remain living, relevant and adaptable," he said. "By standardising AI terms, we are helping to modernise our languages and ensure that their speakers are not excluded from the global digital conversation."

The glossary is available immediately and will be freely accessible to the public. It will serve as a reference for anyone working in education, translation, or technology, and will support continued efforts to promote linguistic inclusion across the continent.

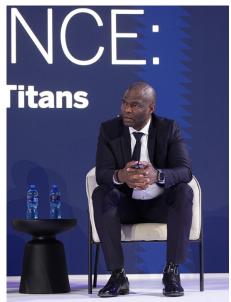

## Who is the new CEO of Standard Bank of South Africa? Meet David Hodnett



avid Hodnett officially steps into the role of CEO at Standard Bank of South Africa, following a distinguished career in the banking sector. His appointment marks a pivotal moment for the bank as it navigates a complex financial landscape.

When the Prudential Authority greenlit his appointment in October 2025, David Hodnett officially assumed the role of Chief Executive Officer of Standard Bank of South Africa (SBSA), succeeding Kenny Fihla. His elevation follows a storied path in South Africa's banking sector, defined by risk oversight, operational stewardship, and internal leadership transitions.

Hodnett's roots lie in audit and advisory: prior to his executive banking career, he served as a partner at KPMG South Africa. He first joined Standard Bank in the 2000s, climbing through executive risk roles in its personal and business banking divisions. In 2008, he made a notable move to Absa,

where his portfolio expanded. He held roles including Chief Risk Officer, Finance Director, and eventually Deputy CEO of South Africa, overseeing areas such as IT, operations, and the "Rest of Africa" business.

In February 2010, Absa announced his appointment as Group Finance Director, while he retained risk responsibilities for a transitional period. During his Absa tenure, Hodnett navigated both growth and structural transformation, deploying capital, managing risk frameworks, and integrating cross-border operations.

### Return to Standard: Risk, Ethics, Corporate Affairs

In March 2019, he rejoined Standard Bank as Group Chief Risk Officer, succeeding Neil Surgey.

His return came after a period of change in banking regulation and market volatility, making the risk function central to the group's resilience. By 1 January 2021, his mandate expanded — he was appointed Chief Risk and Corporate Affairs Officer, integrating governance, ethics, stakeholder engagement, and reputation oversight alongside risk.

During a leadership shuffle, Hodnett briefly served as interim CEO for Business and Commercial Clients within Standard Bank Group between August and December 2021, before returning to his core portfolio in January 2022.

In January 2022, his expanded role formally took effect. Under his stewardship, Standard Bank has progressively calibrated its risk appetite, elevated ESG and stakeholder dimensions, and bolstered internal governance across group operations.

#### The SBSA Mandate

Hodnett's new leadership comes amid strategic succession moves. With his transition, Thabani Ndwandwe will assume the Group Chief Risk Officer role (while retaining his SBSA risk functions).

Sim Tshabalala, CEO of Standard Bank Group, emphasised that Hodnett's appointment signals the group's internal depth of leadership succession. "David has extensive experience in South Africa's financial services sector and has demonstrated exceptional leadership capabilities in our group," remarked Tshabalala.

Hodnett officially took charge of SBSA following regulatory clearance from the Prudential Authority. One of his early tasks: integrating risk oversight with commercial agility in a volatile macro environment, while managing regulatory expectations, digital transformation, and the intensifying South African credit landscape.

If he succeeds, this may mark a turning point in how South Africa's banking giants cultivate internal leadership and integrate risk, reputation, and strategy seamlessly.

## 'My Father's Shadow' opens Africa XChange Summit 2025

he first-ever Africa XChange Summit, held October 15–16 during Film Festival Cologne, brought together Africa's top creatives, tech firms, and investors to shape the future of media and innovation.

**COLOGNE, Germany** — For the first time, the Africa XChange Summit joined the lineup at the Film Festival Cologne this week, bringing together African filmmakers, producers, tech entrepreneurs, and investors for two days of conversations about the continent's fast-growing creative economy.

The event, held Oct. 15–16, offered a platform for African innovators to showcase new ideas, explore business models, and build bridges with global audiences.

The summit opened Wednesday night with the Nigerian feature film My Father's Shadow, a semi-autobiographical drama by director Akinola Davies Jr. The film — the first Nigerian title ever selected for competition at the Cannes International Film Festival — has since been chosen by the United Kingdom as its Oscar submission for Best International Feature Film.

The story follows two brothers, Akin and Remi, played by Godwin and Chibuike Marvellous Egbo, as their father drives them from their rural home to Lagos amid the unrest surrounding Nigeria's 1993 elections. What begins as an ordinary journey becomes a defining day for both the family and the nation. Davies blends a child's point of view with the turbulence of history, crafting what he has called "a love letter to Lagos."

#### A booming creative frontier

By Thursday, discussions turned from cinema to the wider landscape of Africa's creative industries — including film, gaming, technology, and finance — and how they are reshaping the continent's economic future. Speakers highlighted the rising global demand for African talent and content, especially among a young, digitally connected population.

Demographics, digitalization, and a growing start-up culture are fueling optimism. Nigeria's "Nollywood" remains the most visible example: producing roughly 2,500 films each year, it has become the world's second-largest film industry after India's

Bollywood and ahead of Hollywood in output.

The sector, according to a UNESCO report, could generate more than 20 million jobs across Africa if its full potential is realized. Much of that growth is tied to digital tools and online distribution, which have opened global markets to African creators.

"The creative industry is one of the most dynamic sectors on the African continent," said Philipp Hoffmann, Managing Director of Rushlake Media, one of the event's organizers. "And Africans' growing self-confidence is justified. They are actively taking their future into their own hands."

He added, "In Germany, this is still too rarely recognized. It's time for that to change." **Beyond aid:** toward equal partnership

Participants agreed that Africa's creative boom is not just an artistic movement but an economic one — and that meaningful collaboration with Europe must go beyond development aid. What the continent needs, they argued, is equal access to global



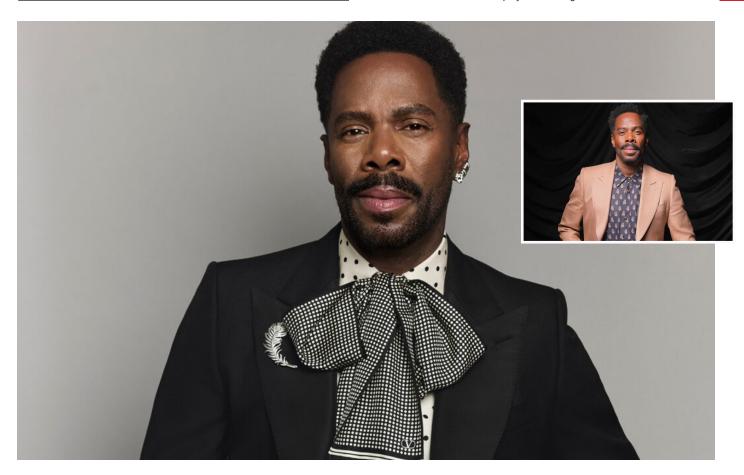
markets and financial resources.

"It's often young creative people who come up with their own ideas and new solutions to local challenges," Hoffmann said. "That's far more successful than importing familiar models from the Western world."

The Africa XChange Summit was organized by Rushlake Media in partnership with the production company Die Gesellschaft DGS, with programming curated by renowned British-Nigerian film curator Nadia Denton. The conference was supported by the Filmund Medienstiftung NRW and the Film Festival Cologne.

"With this conference, we want to put African countries in the spotlight," Hoffmann explained. "The African creative industry should get the visibility and resources it needs to reach its full potential."

Rushlake Media, which operates out of Cologne and Nairobi, has built a reputation for helping African content reach international platforms — a mission the summit echoed throughout its sessions.
