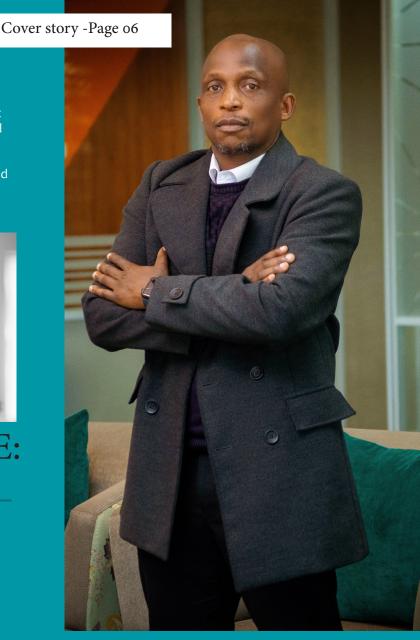

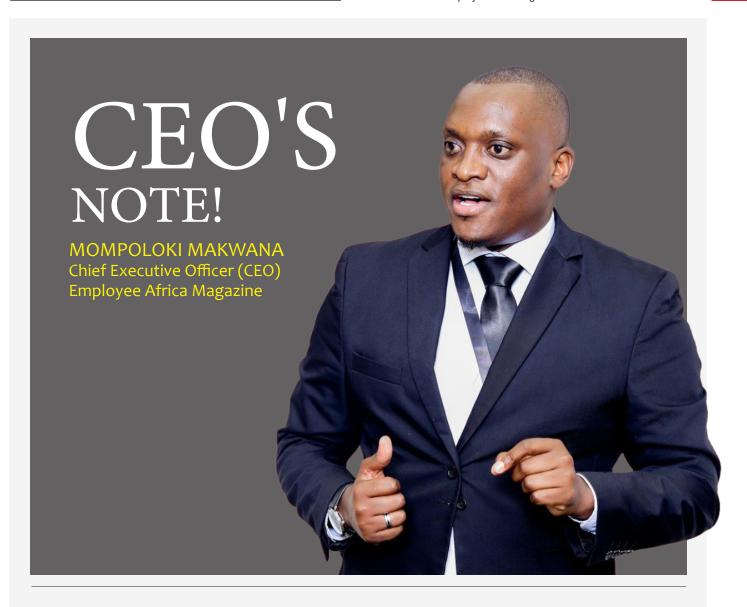

ith a distinguished career spanning over two decades, Mlungisi was appointed Director of Human Resources at FNBB, effective 1st September 2022.

He holds a BA in Economics and a B.Com Honours in Organisational Psychology from the University of Cape Town. He further completed his M.Com in Organisational Psychology through the University of South Africa (Source: FNBB).

He said instilling high performance culture requires that then environment is conducive enough to allows the staff to perform at their optimal best and that they can stand the test of the times.

He said he leads a wonderful team that is reporting to him and comprises Head of Human Capital, Kopi, Employee Relations

Specialist Sinati Takawira seconded from FNB Zambia.

Mlungisi shared that from early on in his career, he had a dream to one day work for First National Bank Botswana — a brand that holds a special place in his heart.

He revealed that his admiration for FNBB began while he was still studying in Cape Town.

"The bank was highly valued by its employees, many of whom I interacted with at the time. The value proposition was incredible. FNBB is an innovative institution, and its organisational culture is truly exceptional," Jackalas said with enthusiasm.

Mlungisi is deeply passionate about selfdevelopment, mindset transformation, psychological assessments, highperformance coaching, and enhancing organisational effectiveness.

Throughout his career, he has led and contributed to large-scale change initiatives including organisational restructuring, the implementation of talent management frameworks, and overseeing the people component of major projects, such as the MCM 2 expansion. In that role, he spearheaded continuous business improvement interventions.

His passion for psychology is rooted in one of his core life principles: the pursuit of meaning and purpose. He believes that true leadership requires a deep understanding of human behavior and personal conviction.

"I'm a firm believer that there is a God," he shared, adding that faith and purpose are central to how he approaches both life and

INCLUSION/ DIVERSITY

Jackalas emphasized that inclusion, equality, diversity, and a sense of belonging are fundamental pillars at FNBB.

He noted that the bank has made significant progress in advancing gender representation, with 65% of its workforce being female and 35% male.

"Gender inclusivity is very important to us. We also engage our employees on pressing societal issues such as Gender-Based Violence. For example, we host Pitso ya Borre sessions — safe spaces where men come together to have open conversations, because often as men, we don't speak up about issues that affect us," he explained. Wellness, he added, is another critical focus area for the bank. FNBB offers one of the most comprehensive employee wellness programs in Botswana, facilitated by Dr. Patronella Mbaiwa.

NEW TRENDS

Jackalas highlighted that FNBB is fully aware of the rapidly evolving business landscape, where emerging trends like Artificial Intelligence (AI) are taking center stage globally.

He acknowledged that FNBB is not immune to such advancements and is actively embracing tools like ChatGPT, which play a critical role in areas such as data analytics and operational efficiency.

"We have a dedicated Data and Analytics Division made up of eight highly skilled Data Scientists who have undergone extensive AI training through a comprehensive course abroad," he shared.

"They are among the best—and the quality of their reporting is exceptional. Data is extremely important to us as a business."

WORD OF ADVICE

Jackalas's parting advice to young, aspiring professionals is to recognize that the world of work is constantly evolving, demanding

agility and the ability to adapt quickly. He stressed the importance of preparing for more than just a single job — encouraging a broader approach to career development. "Don't limit yourself to just one role. In today's dynamic work environment, acquiring new skills that will be relevant in the future is essential. Versatility is key. In the past, we prepared ourselves mainly for employment, but today, the landscape has changed, and many are now encouraged to create their own opportunities," he said.

He further emphasized the need to trust the journey:

"The future is unpredictable. You never know where you'll be tomorrow, so it's vital to stay ready and focused on the next chapter of your career."

Jackalas also highlighted the importance of self-awareness and continuous personal development, urging individuals to consistently invest in improving their skills.

Dodo outlined capacities

as a critical lever to build this resilience. Unlike traditional training, coaching empowers leaders to understand their own mindsets and unlock deep, sustainable growth. Dodo outlined how targeted coaching strengthens five key leadership capacities: self-awareness, adaptability, empathy, visionary thinking, and emotional regulation. These traits enable leaders to inspire teams, navigate complexity, and maintain focus even in the face of crisis.

> She presented evidence showing that organizations investing in coaching realize measurable gains. Case studies revealed significant improvements in project delivery, employee engagement, innovation, and financial performance one organization recorded a 19% increase

in revenue per employee and a 32-point improvement in project timeliness after an eight-month coaching program.

Dodo stressed that coaching is not just a cost but a strategic investment with long-term returns. It creates a pipeline of leaders ready to drive transformation, foster psychological safety, and position their organizations for enduring success in the marketplace.

Her message was clear: the future belongs to those willing to move beyond static leadership models and embrace coaching as a catalyst for growth. By developing resilient, emotionally intelligent leaders, African organizations can unlock their true potential and create workplaces defined by adaptability, innovation, and sustained performance.

how targeted coaching strengthens five key leadership



Dodo opened her presentation by emphasizing that resilience is no longer a nice-to-have—it has become the new leadership currency. In an era shaped by volatility, technological disruption, and shifting work models, leaders must do more than react; they must bounce forward and cultivate cultures of innovation and trust.

She explained that coaching has emerged

WORKPLACE EXCELLENCE IS NO LONGER JUST ABOUT PERFORMANCE

– IT REQUIRES EMOTIONAL RESILIENCE

t the 2025 Employee Africa Summit, renowned leadership expert and coach Lorato Maano-Mosetlhanyane delivered a compelling presentation that challenged traditional views of success in the workplace. As a Professional Certified Coach (ICF), Maxwell Leadership Executive Director, Enneagram & DISC Certified Practitioner, and Founding Director at PinnaLead, Maano-Mosetlhanyane brought extensive experience and insight to center stage—calling on African organizations to lead from a place of emotional strength, not just strategic execution.

Her presentation, under the summit theme "Empowering Workforce Emotional Resilience," emphasized that in today's volatile economic and social environment, resilience is more than a buzzword. It is a necessity. Across Africa and particularly in Botswana, workforces are navigating high stress, job insecurity, youth unemployment, rising genderbased violence, and the aftershocks of global crises. In such an environment, the ability of teams to emotionally adapt, recover from setbacks, and thrive under pressure has become a vital leadership

"Resilience," she explained, "is the ability to recover or adjust easily to misfortune or change. Emotional resilience is the internal engine that allows individuals and teams to cope with challenges, maintain mental wellness, and continue performing without burning out."

Quoting, "The strength of a leader is not just in driving results, but in creating an environment where people feel safe to fall, supported to rise, and empowered to thrive," she reminded leaders that their role is no longer about control—but about cultivating safety, trust, and

emotional agility.

Maano-Mosetlhanyane outlined the six foundational pillars of emotional resilience in the workplace: self-awareness, emotional stability, flexibility, self-efficacy, social support, and work-life integration. These, she emphasized, are not abstract concepts, but daily practices

that foster stronger collaboration, sharper decision-making, improved engagement, and ultimately, business continuity.

She also addressed the common stressors plaguing today's organizations: heavy workloads, constant change, limited access to mental health support, and a lack of psychological safety. Emotional resilience, she argued, offers the antidote.

Her message to leadership was clear—resilience begins at the top. Leaders must lead by example, model calm under pressure, create a culture of psychological safety, and practice Botho—a deep respect for humanity and compassion in action. She urged organizations to go beyond surface-level wellness programs, and instead invest in mental health training, emotional intelligence coaching, open dialogue, and flexible work practices.

Tools like journaling, mindfulness, breathing exercises, and boundary-setting were highlighted as key strategies for individuals to build internal resilience, while team-based practices like regular check-ins and peer support were shown to boost collective morale and trust.

The session ended with a call to shift toward human-centered leadership. Organizations must normalize mental health conversations, intentionally create safe workspaces, and engage with employees as whole people—valuing their well-being, personal growth, and unique emotional journeys.

In today's Africa, emotional resilience is not just about recovery—it's about future-readiness. It's what separates workplaces that survive from those that lead, innovate, and thrive.

China Studies Specialist, Intercultural Leadership Strategist and a Managing Director at Employee Africa, Nikita Makwana offered valuable insights on how African leaders and organizations can thrive in an increasingly global and diverse environment.

Makwana opened her talk by drawing attention to a staggering fact: over 70% of international business ventures fail not because of strategy or finance, but due to cultural misunderstandings. She emphasized that in today's interconnected world, especially for a continent as dynamic and diverse as Africa, Cultural Intelligence (CQ) is a critical leadership asset.

Unlike IQ or EQ, CQ measures the ability to relate and work effectively across

different cultures, a skill now essential for driving resilient and adaptive leadership.

She explained that resilience in leadership is no longer just about stability—it's about adaptability in the face of cultural diversity and change. She broke down CQ into four essential components: CQ Drive (motivation to engage across cultures), CQ Knowledge (understanding cultural norms), CQ Strategy (planning in multicultural settings), and CQ Action (adapting behavior and communication styles). Makwana noted that CQ empowers leaders to not only manage change but to turn cultural complexity into a strength for innovation and growth.

She stressed that building resilient teams starts with understanding and

valuing cultural diversity. Leaders who cultivate CQ are better positioned to navigate uncertainty, lead inclusively, and innovate effectively within complex, changing environments—all of which are crucial for Africa's continued growth.

Through this lens, Makwana challenged African leaders to not just manage cultural diversity, but to leverage it as a source of strength and innovation. Her message was clear: resilience is built through inclusion, adaptability, and the courage to lead differently.

By embracing Cultural Intelligence, African organizations can unlock deeper collaboration, enhance innovation, and position themselves for long-term success in a rapidly evolving global landscape.

THE FUTURE OF WORK HAS ARRIVED – CULTIVATING RESILIENT TEAMS IS NO LONGER A CHOICE, IT'S A STRATEGY

[MOMPOLOKI MAKWANA: A transformational leadership coach and Chief Executive Officer at Employee Africa]

t the 2025 Employee Africa Summit, Coach Mompoloki Makwana, a transformation leadership coach and Chief Executi Officer at Employee Africa, deliver a powerful session titled "Cultivati Resilient Teams: Mindset and Attitu Change". With clarity and urgen he addressed a critical truth faci modern organizations: the future work is not a distant idea—it is alrea here, and only the most adaptal teams will thrive.

Makwana began by referenci insights from the Society of Hum Resource Management, emphasizi that shifts in how people work from remote and hybrid setups evolving employee expectations—are permanently redefining the workplace. For organizations to remain relevant and effective, they must prioritize team resilience, workforce development, and leadership evolution in alignment with these changes.

Central to his message was a call to redefine what leadership means today. According to Makwana, resilient teams do not emerge by chance; they are built through intentional efforts that begin with individual growth. He explained that the strength of a team is a reflection of its people—and that leadership must focus on empowering individuals to lead themselves first. "Team growth," he stressed, "is driven by individual development. If you grow the person, you grow the team."

He went on to outline key statements that define a resilient team in today's environment: alignment around a sharedvision, accountability structures, clear incentives, and continuous reflection on organizational values. Leaders must constantly re-center their teams on purpose, vision, and values, while creating an environment



that encourages self-leadership and collaboration.

But to lead resilient teams effectively, leaders themselves must undergo key mindset shifts. Makwana outlined four transformative shifts modern leaders must embrace. First, they must help individuals recognize themselves as leaders—regardless of position by fostering self-leadership and ownership. Second, they must create opportunities for retooling, enabling learning, unlearning, and relearning to become everyday norms. Third, leaders must embody and promote a new workplace culture that can absorb shocks and navigate complexity. Finally, they must learn to manage the balance between long-term vision and short-term goals, ensuring that daily decisions are aligned with the broader organizational mission.

Throughout his presentation, Makwana highlighted subtle yet powerful truths about communication, leadership influence, and team culture. "What is not said is just as important as what is," he reminded attendees.

cautioning leaders to be mindful of unspoken dynamics, body language, and how their presence and decisions are perceived by teams.

He also emphasized the importance of cross-functional alignment, a 360-degree leadership approach, and the need for continuous adjustment of objectives as the environment changes. Today's teams need clarity, consistency, and connection. And for organizations that desire to be resilient, the role of leadership has never been more critical.

Coach Makwana closed with a message that echoed across the summit: the organizations that will succeed tomorrow are those that are rethinking how they lead today. Cultivating resilience is not about responding to crisis, but preparing for it. It's about investing in people, refining culture, and elevating leadership with courage, vision, and humility.

To build the future, we must lead it—and that begins with cultivating resilient teams.

t the 2025 Employee Africa Summit, Professor Alinah K. Segobye, speaking on behalf of the Human Resource Development Council (HRDC), delivered a powerful CEO presentation under the theme "Empowering Workforce Resilience: Fostering Innovative Continuous Workplace Learning for a Knowledge-Based Economy." Her message was clear and forward-looking: Botswana's future success in a rapidly changing global environment depends on how well we equip our people to adapt, innovate, and thrive.

The presentation opened by framing resilience not simply as the ability to bounce back, but as the ability to move forward—stronger, wiser, and more agile. In the face of economic uncertainty, youth unemployment, digital disruption, and climate-related challenges, the strength of Botswana's economy will rely on its people's capacity to learn continuously and respond dynamically.

Professor Segobye emphasized that workforce resilience is built through adaptability, emotional and mental strength, and ongoing skills renewal. These qualities, when cultivated within teams and institutions, not only drive national productivity but also enhance economic stability and reduce the growing mismatch between job market demands and workforce skills.

At the center of HRDC's strategy is a commitment to modernize Botswana's education and skills development systems. This includes revitalizing TVET, scaling up digital and green skills training, and establishing a national culture of



lifelong learning. Special emphasis was placed on empowering vulnerable populations—youth, women, and people with disabilities—through targeted, inclusive interventions.

Professor Segobye noted that resilience and innovation must go hand in hand. Botswana's progress toward a knowledge-based economy requires not just technical training, but also the development of entrepreneurial mindsets. HRDC is working to promote creativity through innovation hubs and

to harness the potential of the Fourth Industrial Revolution (4IR), including AI, to prepare citizens for emerging roles.

She also highlighted the need for coordinated partnerships between government, education institutions, and industry. By aligning skills development with national economic needs, HRDC—through the National Human Resource Development Strategy and the Human Resource Development Fund—is enabling organizations and individuals to access meaningful learning

pathways.

Beyond frameworks and funding, the presentation emphasized building a learning culture within organizations. Tools like mentorships, apprenticeships, coaching, on-the-job training, and competency-based models were highlighted as necessary to strengthen skills application and leadership development. Professor Segobye advocated for integrating learning with performance systems—rewarding growth with recognition, certification, and advancement.

Importantly, the presentation called attention to the emotional dimension of resilience. Stress management, mindfulness, and emotional intelligence were presented as core training areas for today's teams. Leaders must prioritize not only the development of their teams' technical capabilities but also their well-being, self-awareness, and adaptability.

Professor Segobye closed her address with a clear call to action: we must shift toward a national mindset that sees people as our most important investment.

Botswana's economic progress will not come from policy alone—but from a bold, united commitment to continuous learning, inclusive growth, and human-centered innovation. Resilient people build resilient nations—and the time to empower them is now.

Building a Purposeful Career with Others

urpose is about impacting and influencing people- how does that play out in your career journey when trying to showcase my capabilities, grow, and be successful professionally? Why should you bring others into the work you are doing and potentially share the wins with others?

These questions are not unreasonable, especially if you have a clear vision and a career goal driving you. You may instinctively want to be laser-focused on perfecting and protecting your work and professional brand by proving yourself and your value in the workplace. The truth is that some of the greatest successes in your career will require a dimension collaboration through partnerships, mentorships, and bringing others along in teams, which exponentially expands your impact. When you are teaming with the right team with a common purpose and direction, there is just so much that cannot be done, especially when aligned with a purpose beyond oneself as reinforced in the bible with stories such as the tower of babel, where it was recognized that a group of people with a shared vision and purpose can be unstoppable. In addition, the Ubuntu philosophy —"I am because we are"—reminds us that our identity. growth, and success are deeply interwoven with the lives of others. This translates into a powerful principle: You go faster alone, but you go further—and deeper—with others.

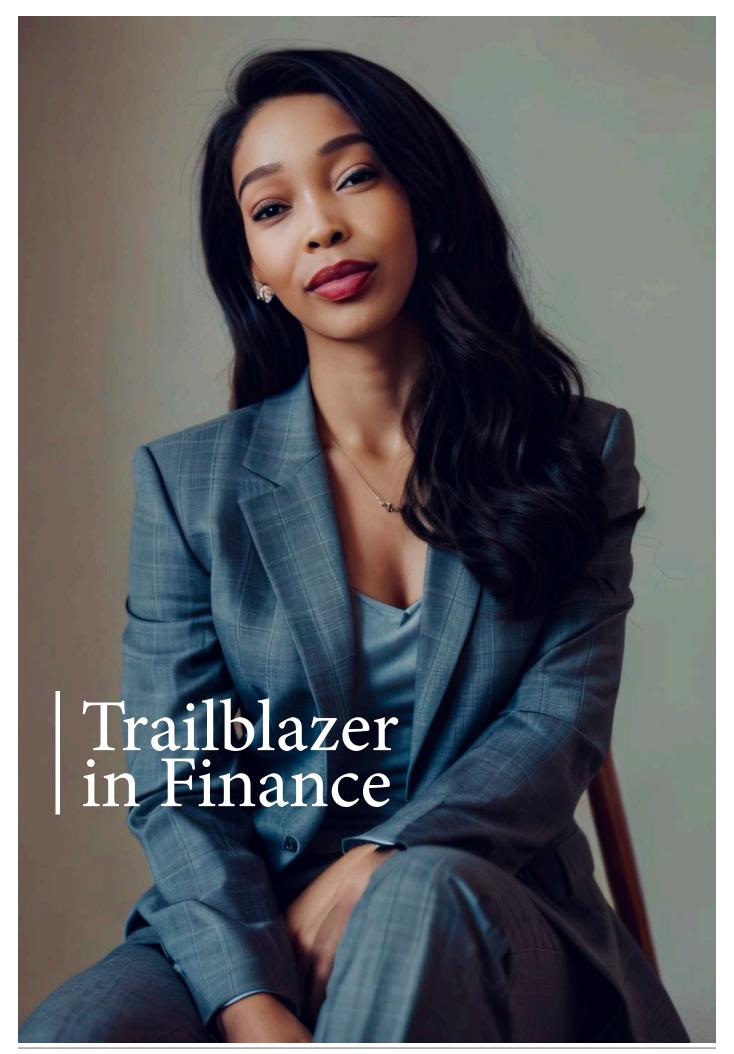

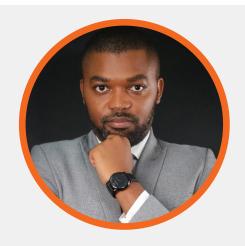

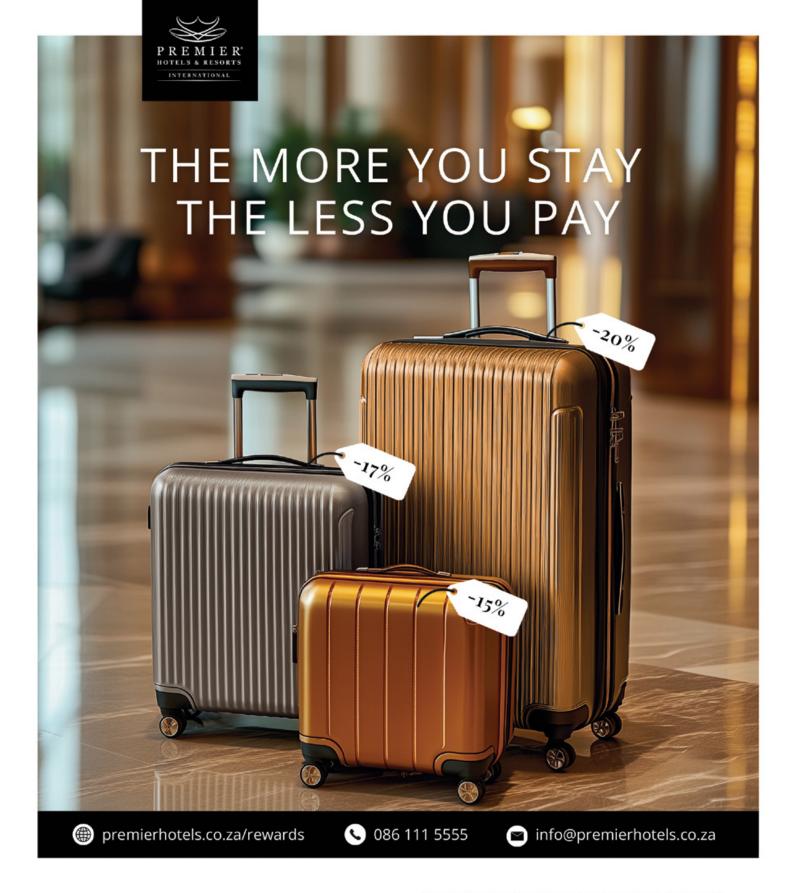

BMI warns the Pula's worth could slip

"We believe that Botswana's currency arrangement will likely come under threat due to the rapid depletion of the country's foreign reserve holdings,"

B otswana's long-standing currency arrangement is under mounting pressure as foreign exchange reserves fall to historic lows. Analysts at BMI warn that unless exports improve, "policymakers will probably be forced to adjust the currency peg within the next two years."

The latest BMI review highlights instability in Botswana's external sector. The country's diamond-driven growth model, once a pillar of resilience, is no longer generating enough foreign currency to maintain the exchange rate peg.

"We believe that Botswana's currency arrangement will likely come under threat due to the rapid depletion of the country's foreign reserve holdings," the report said. "Unless foreign exchange receipts increase, we believe that the Bank of Botswana (BoB) will be compelled to induce a devaluation of the currency."

As of February 2025, Botswana's foreign reserves had fallen to just 5.2 months of import cover—the lowest level on record. That's well below the BoB's usual cushion of more than 10 months and close to the International Monetary Fund's minimum recommended threshold of three months.

"Foreign reserves have been falling sharply since 2018 following a series of wide current account deficits," BMI analysts noted. Reserves briefly recovered in 2022, supported by postpandemic diamond demand and IMF disbursements, but the decline resumed in 2024 at an accelerated pace.

The latest collapse is being driven by continued weakness in Botswana's primary export: natural diamonds. Depressed global demand has sent reserves to record lows, limiting the central bank's ability to intervene in the

foreign exchange market.

"The emergence of lab-grown diamonds is weighing heavily on natural stone prices and export earnings," BMI said. De Beers recently confirmed that diamond production in Botswana contracted by 8.0 percent year-on-year in the first quarter of 2025, a sign of sustained global softness.

With liquidity shrinking, BMI said the BoB has resorted to drawing from the Pula Fund—Botswana's sovereign wealth fund—to meet forex obligations. This move breaks from the bank's long-standing framework on reserve use. The BoB structures its foreign reserves in three tranches: the Liquidity Portfolio, the Pula Fund, and assets held with the IMF.

"According to the BoB's own guidelines, the only fund that should be used to service foreign exchange demand is the Liquidity Portfolio," BMI highlighted.

Yet since 2009, policymakers have routinely tapped the Pula Fund to meet local foreign exchange demand. As of February 2025, the fund's value had dropped to its lowest point in two decades.

"Without a steady and reliable source of foreign exchange, this practice is not sustainable," analysts warned.

Botswana's reserves are also under pressure from capital outflows triggered by diverging interest rates. While peer economies in the pula's currency basket—most notably South Africa and the United States—have raised rates, Botswana has kept its policy rates relatively low. This widening rate differential has made the country more vulnerable to capital flight. "Botswana Often Bucks the Trend," the report remarked, referencing the BoB's historically independent approach to monetary policy. Large foreign reserves previously allowed the central bank to deviate from the monetary stance of

basket peers. However, BMI warned that such independence may no longer be viable in the next two to three years without stronger reserves.

"In recent years, however, the central bank's ability to intervene in the foreign exchange market has come under threat," the report stated.

Adding to the strain is Botswana's sluggish economic performance, especially compared to its main trading partners.

"Botswana's economic growth is likely to underperform that of its trading partners," BMI forecasts.

Botswana's economy has traditionally tracked the growth of the U.S. and South Africa, which together account for 75 percent of the pula's currency basket. But with natural diamonds now relegated to a smaller segment of the luxury market, BMI believes that pattern is unlikely to continue.

BMI said events like the recessions of

2015 and 2024—unique to Botswana—may become more frequent. The firm said such pressures make the current peg system unsustainable and will likely force the government to devalue the currency, abandon monetary independence, or impose capital controls.

BMI noted that capital controls would deter foreign direct investment, which Botswana is trying to attract under its economic diversification strategy. In addition, a tighter monetary policy aligned with South Africa or the U.S. would worsen the domestic slowdown.

"The benefits of pula devaluation are two-fold: it would reduce the pressure on foreign reserves and boost the competitiveness of Botswana's non-diamond exports, supporting policymakers' diversification goals," the report said.

The research firm projects a devaluation of 10 to 15 percent, which would shift the exchange rate from the current P13.4/USD to between P14.9/USD and P15.7/USD.

BMI ruled out a steeper 30 to 50 percent devaluation, saying such a move is highly unlikely. The pula is not significantly overvalued, and historical devaluations have averaged 8.5 percent.

However, with reserves falling at a rapid pace and structural challenges mounting in the diamond sector, BMI warned that this devaluation could be larger than average.

Botswana Rises to Davis Cup Group IV



he promotion was sealed in dramatic fashion Saturday afternoon after Botswana defeated Madagascar 2-1 in a decisive doubles match during the promotional playoffs of the Davis Cup Africa Group V tournament.

Against the backdrop of a raucous home crowd and a searing Gaborone sun, the Botswana men's tennis team secured a landmark promotion to Davis Cup Group IV, signalling a major step forward for the nation's tennis ambitions.

The promotion was sealed in dramatic fashion Saturday afternoon after Botswana defeated Madagascar 2-1 in a decisive doubles match during the promotional playoffs of the Davis Cup Africa Group V tournament.

With the tie level at 1-1, all eyes turned to the final game — a doubles showdown between Botswana's Ntungamili Raguin and Mark Nawa against Madagascar's Valentin Rakotondrasoa and Nicolas Raharivony.

Reserve of grit and teamwork

The Botswana pair delivered under pressure, drawing upon a deep reserve of grit and teamwork to outlast their opponents from the Indian ocean island state and spark celebrations that reverberated across the Notwane Tennis Courts.

"The boys understood the assignment and owned the moment," said Tshepang Tlhankane, spokesperson of the Botswana Tennis Association, in a telephone interview. "They were extremely hungry, and the hunger is what drove us into Group IV."

For Botswana, the victory was more than a promotion — it was redemption.

Despite the advantage of playing on home soil last year, the national team fell short of their goals during the same competition. That disappointment lingered, fuelling the team's motivation this time around.

Once beaten, twice shy"

"The team came determined to correct what we missed last year," said Tlhankane. "The mandate is always to come out tops if you're hosting, and we didn't achieve that. But the boys said 'once beaten, twice shy,' and they were not going to let it happen again."

BTA credited their improved hosting arrangements and preparation as key contributors to the team's success. Building on lessons from the 2023 edition of the tournament, organisers refined logistics and operations to ensure a seamless experience for visiting teams.

"Hosting was smooth," said Tlhankane. "We used last year's tournament as a reference point and made sure this year was as smooth as possible."

Positive feedback all round

The five-day event, which drew 15 African nations to Gaborone, was widely praised by visiting delegations for its professional organisation, hospitality and spirited atmosphere.

"All we got is positive feedback," Tlhankane noted. "Every team that was represented here shared the same sentiment — from hospitality and on-court action to off-court coordination. The feedback is all in unison."But beyond the trophies and rankings, the Davis Cup's true impact may lie in its inspiration of future tennis stars.

"Young kids got involved in the Davis Cup as ball persons and had the opportunity to witness high-performance tennis at close range," Tlhankane said.

Higher tier

"It really helps with motivation. When they see their favourite players compete against some of the continent's best, it plants a seed of success in their minds — and all we have to do is cultivate it." Botswana's promotion, alongside Mozambique from a competitive pool of 15 nations, signals growing momentum in the country's tennis development efforts. Botswana travel guides

Coffee is more than a morning ritual — it's the go-to productivity hack for millions. But how much of its focus-boosting power is science, and how much is just hype? We break down the facts, timing, and the real impact of your daily cup.

Most of us love the taste of coffee. But we also know that in our heart of hearts, it's about more than just taste. It's the morning ritual and the little brain boost before we dive headfirst into meetings, deadlines and never-ending email threads. Whether you're brewing a cup at home or stopping by the local cafe, coffee has become the official productivity drink. But this begs the question — does it actually help you focus, or is it just a very tasty placebo?

Caffeine has been hyped as the holy grail of concentration for years. And in South Africa (like most of the world), it's practically a cultural cornerstone. But before you chug that third mug before 10am, it's worth unravelling what's really up behind the buzz. Are you sharpening your mind, or just delaying the inevitable crash?

Let's break it down, bean by bean:

1. Caffeine can improve focus — to a point

First things first: how does caffeine even work on our brains? When you drink coffee, caffeine blocks a neurotransmitter called adenosine (aka the stuff that makes you feel sleepy). This increases the activity of other neurotransmitters such as dopamine and norepinephrine, a combination that can promote wakefulness and enhance short-term focus. You'll also be more likely to power through a task list without tuning out midway.

This is why so many companies are investing in coffee machines for business settings. It's a great way to keep spirits and energy levels up. If your team can be sharp and alert during key hours, it's a win-win. But remember, it's not a miracle solution. That initial burst of concentration doesn't mean your focus will last forever, especially if you overdo it. The key is knowing when and how much to consume.

The "optimal dose" is smaller than you think

Extra caffeine doesn't translate to extra focus. In fact, the sweet spot tends to be somewhere between 100 and 200 milligrams of caffeine, which is about the amount in one strong mug of coffee. More than that and you're in the jittery zone: shaking hands, spooling thoughts and an attention span that's all over the place. It's like salt in food — you can add a little as seasoning, but too much ruins the dish.

Your body also builds a tolerance for caffeine over time, so if you're chugging five pots a day just to feel normal, you're probably not even getting the desired mental boost. What's worse, high caffeine intake can disrupt your sleep, and poor sleep is a massive focus killer.

So, rather than endlessly chasing that buzz, it probably makes sense to use caffeine sparingly: a cup in the morning, and perhaps a little top-up in early afternoon if you absolutely need one. Anything beyond 3pm? Risky business for your sleep hygiene!

3. Coffee vs energy drinks: Not all buzzes are equal

Many people use energy drinks and caffeine pills in place of coffee, and believe they'll receive the same mental boost. But here's the thing: those alternatives are often laden with sugar, artificial flavours and way too much caffeine. They might provide a quick and intense jolt, but the post-high crash can be punishing. Plus, that over-amped feeling isn't exactly conducive to calm, sustained focus. You're wired, not sharp.

Coffee, on the other hand, works a little gentler. Especially if you're drinking it black or with just a dash of milk, it doesn't spike your blood sugar in the same way. Some studies even suggest that the antioxidants in coffee could have neuroprotective effects



in the long term, although we shouldn't fool ourselves into thinking our cappuccino is a health elixir, of course. Still, when it comes to focus, plain old coffee is often the smarter choice over flashy cans with neon branding.

4. Timing really matters

You know those mornings when your brain just refuses to boot up, no matter how much caffeine you throw at it? That might be because you're drinking coffee too early. Our cortisol levels, the natural hormone that wakes us up, peak around 30 to 45 minutes after we wake. So, chugging a cup of coffee right after hopping out of bed can actually dull its effects. A better idea is to wait an hour or so and let your body do its thing first.

Afternoon slumps are another story. This is when a well-timed coffee can really save the day. A shot of espresso at around 2pm or 3pm (no later) can push you through the dip without ruining your sleep. Just keep in mind that when you add caffeine on top of stress or anxiety, it can magnify those feelings and make it harder for you to stay grounded. Caffeine's true power lies in timing and moderation, not in volume.

5. Some people just don't react eell — and that's OK

Here's a real curveball: Caffeine doesn't have the same effect on all people. Various factors, namely genetics, body weight, tolerance and even your hormone levels, can all impact how you metabolise it. Some people can gulp three espressos down and doze off an hour later. Others are incredibly sensitive to caffeine and feel sick to their stomach or completely overstimulated from just half a cup. If you belong to the latter group, don't try to force yourself into the coffee culture simply because everybody else is doing it.

There are other ways to enhance your focus, such as staying hydrated, taking a quick walk or practising mindfulness. Even just getting good sleep and taking a break from screens can make a world of difference for your clarity. Coffee is a tool, not a necessity. If it works for you, great. If it doesn't, no biggie.

6. Habit vs help: When coffee becomes a crutch

Last but not least, if we're being 100% honest, a lot of us are drinking coffee not for focus, but out of habit. It's part of the morning routine, the social lubricant in office kitchens, the "treat" we allow ourselves before doing something difficult and even a self-confidence boost. There's nothing wrong with that, but if you find yourself relying on it to function, maybe it's

time to re-evaluate. Is coffee keeping you focused, or simply masking exhaustion, or even burnout?

If your energy levels are perpetually in the bin, remember that caffeine is a band-aid, not a fix. Real focus comes from a mix of lifestyle choices: sleep, diet, exercise and mental clarity. Coffee can absolutely enhance those things, but it can't replace them. So, focus on building the foundation first, then let coffee be the cherry on top, not the whole cake.

The final sip

So, does drinking coffee actually help you focus? Yes, but only when used wisely. It can make your brain sharper, enhance your attention span and help you power through challenging tasks. But it's not magic. It has to be timed right, dosed sensibly and used in conjunction with healthy habits, not instead of them.

In South Africa, where our coffee culture is strong and still growing, it's easy to lean into the bean. Just make sure you're using it to support your focus, not to compensate for burnout. A good brew can help, but it's not the whole solution. In the end, the best focus doesn't come from caffeine alone — it comes from knowing how to use it like a pro. So, stay grounded and keep sipping smart.
